#### **NPARKS TOPICS**

#### Synopsis

As Singapore continues to urbanise, it has become increasingly important to weave in greenery as a form of relief from our high-density urban environment. It can take the form of preserving tree specimens within development sites and the deliberate planting within specified green areas. The process requires thorough planning at the early design stage, safeguarding of greenery provisions and careful implementation, involving not just the greenery Professionals or Agencies but also all Building Consultants concerned.

Seeking approvals for development plans to satisfy or fulfil the greening intent is a step towards realising greenery within development sites. This topic aims to address some basic submission requirements and some common pitfalls that can be avoided.

**Ms Juliana Jumamin** is currently a Senior Manager in the Policy and Planning Division of National Parks Board. She has more than 10 years of experience in handling development submission plans. She is also an ISA Certified Arborist.

#### 2. Skyrise greenery – Design consideration and technical requirements

#### Synopsis

The optimization of urban greening opportunities have witnessed the union of landscaping efforts and building design in Singapore in the form of skyrise greening on building surfaces. Requiring regular inspection and maintenance, major concerns related to such work spaces at height include sizing efficacy of vegetation systems, their suitable placements on architecture, related safety issues and safe maintainability. There exist design opportunities to calibrate vegetation systems placement, sizing, roof edge designs as well as fall prevention measures to better serve both building and horticulture needs. The presentation will touch on content snippets of existing CUGE Standards (the Skyrise Greenery series) to elaborate on the aforementioned points.

Mr Poh Choon Hock is a researcher at the Centre for Urban Greenery and Ecology (CUGE) under the National Parks Board. His current focus is on skyrise greenery implementation and has shared at various workshops, courses and forums. Choon Hock has published several articles on skyrise greenery, including "Safe Design of Skyrise Greenery in Singapore" which was jointly authored with Dr Michael Behm and published in the magazine "Smart and Sustainable Built Environment" in 2012.

#### 1. Indian Heritage Centre

Singapore's Indian Heritage Centre (IHC) is a sustainable contemporary building, embracing the vibrant streetscape of "Little India" and its people. It houses a museum, art galleries, educational and community spaces, and features a distinctive glazed façade inspired by the baoli, an Indian stepwell that is a traditional meeting place for village communities.

The galleries' external wall serves as an artist's canvas, with a colourful mural installation comprising contemporary and archival images representing the local Indian community. This artwork will be changed every three to five years, allowing the visual identity of the building to evolve over time.

The museum experience is a stimulating and evocative journey, referencing the richly layered and multifaceted nature of Indian Culture from the colourful outward expression of movement on the periphery, through to quiet dark repose and inner reflection in the galleries.

During the day, the façade acts as a mirror reflecting the vibrancy of the adjacent conservation shophouses. At night, it reveals the rich hues of the mural wall as colour changing LED lights dance across the facade to the rhythm of classical Indian music, creating a glowing lantern for Little India.

**Mr Greg Shand** has over 20 years experience as an architect, working and consulting on projects in various parts of the world especially in the Asia Pacific region. He is a member of the Singapore Board of Architects; Architect's Registration Board UK, APEC Architect and has been a practicing Registered Architect in Singapore since 2001.

Embracing a philosophy that marries a Japanese less-is-more ethos with Western values, the firm integrates architecture, interior design and landscaping to create sustainable spaces of intelligent simplicity. The firm has designed a wide range of projects in the region, including more than 20 luxury homes in Sentosa Cove; premium residences in India, Myanmar and Malaysia; boutique hotels in Indonesia and the Indian Heritage Centre in Singapore's "Little India" (in collaboration with URBNarc Pte Ltd).

#### 2. SAFRA Punggol Club

- 1. The concept for SAFRA Punggol was taken from the existing Punggol waterway and it's surrounding sloping terrain. Using water and the undulating form of the natural terrain helped derived the concept of SAFRA Punggol. The organic wing shaped building and Tri colored facade tone is part of the overall cascades concept of terraces and hanging gardens.
- 2. The building is shaped as two wings opening up into the Punggol waterway. As one enters the main lobby (level 3) you are flanked on the right by the triple volume indoor water park for the kids; a "first-time" sheltered wet-play facility in Singapore for NS men and their families to bond in a fun and safe environment, while the left wing houses F&B and the Nurture Stars. As you walk further into the naturally ventilated open lobby, you will be greeted with a commanding view of the Punggol Waterway. Steps will lead you down onto a open courtyard where F&B outlets are located (level 2). This courtyard is partially sheltered and acts as the focal point for the club to house it's many communal activities for NS men. More F&B and recreational facilities are located at the Water promenade level (level 1). Here, the engagement of the public is harnessed to its maximum potential. Levels 4 & 5 houses the various SAFRA recreational facilities like the enrichment classes, gym, bowling alley, spa & wellness, function rooms, winner circle etc.
- 3. With its close proximity to the future Sports Council development, SAFRA Punggol would be a destination of choice where fun flows. Physical connections have already been planned and constructed for the future connections.
- 4. The design of having the atrium and corridors to be natural ventilated, is the first SAFRA club house to have this initiative to help reduce the energy consumption from air condition yet bringing user closer to nature as well as better appreciate the overlooking waterfront.
- Secondly, using only energy efficient lighting (mainly LED lighting) is another highlighted green features for the New SAFRA Punggol. Followed by providing Heat pump system that have >70% energy saving with comparison to a instantaneous heater for shower and warm pool adds up to the energy saving. Lastly, the Teflon roofing for the terrace courtyard and Kids wet play area as well as outdoor performance area will allow subtle sunlight to filter through to light up the spaces underneath, reducing the dependency of artificial lighting, hence energy saved, as well as raw material for concrete roofing saved. To achieve a wholesome sustainable building, every user plays a part. Hence, the "Green Lease" for all vendors to comply will ensure a green building even during operation mode.
- 5. Provision for barrier free accessibility and universal design has achieved the basic certified provision. This include provision for the disabled accessibility environment from the entrance drop-off to the Punggol waterways, children friendly facilities which are located in most of the toilets where children sanitary wares, fittings and appliances are fixed at the children height for their convenience, children showers and toilets. There is also provision of nursing rooms for mothers to feed their babies or changing of their diapers. Family car parking lots are also provided near the lift lobbies for easy access of families with very young children

Backed by 23 years of accrued expertise in the building consultancy business, **Mr Michael Vong** has dedicated his career to promoting high standards and excellence in architectural design and construction in Singapore and overseas.

His ten years of working experience in HDB had enabled him to contribute to the development and implementation of many high rise public housing projects as well as upgrading projects in Singapore. He was also part of the team working on the masterplan for Punggol New Town. #### 3. Oasis Terraces

**Fostering Community Spaces** 

Oasis Terraces is a demonstration in architectural form of one of the key visions for Punggol: the close integration of community and landscape. The design is about the successive framing of community space with garden elements and terraced platforms for community activities that seamlessly connect to the adjacent interior commercial and polyclinic programmes.

The terraced platforms that serve both as a roof over the commercial interior and generous external areas for community gardens and shared facilities. A sense of great spaciousness and immediacy to the exterior environment within a tight development site is achieved. The dimension of community is not relegated as a secondary consideration but an important and integral part of the experience of the neighbourhood mall and polyclinic.

Commercial activities such as food courts, cafes and shops spill out onto the shared terraces where family activities also take place. Overlooking the communal gardens on the platforms are outdoor areas for communal dinning, restaurants, education centres, and polyclinic rooms.

The terraced gardens will play more than just an aesthetic role in the community, at the top-most garden level, it will be a horticultural project, bringing residents together to plant, cultivate and enjoy the fruits of their labour, engendering community bonds though a sense of collective ownership and participation.

**Mr Alvin Foo** graduated from the National University of Singapore and received the Singapore Institute of Architects Gold Medal and Board of Architect's Gold Medal for the Master of Architecture course in 1999.

An architect registered with BOA from 2003, he has been involved in a spectrum of architectural projects ranging from residential, commercial, hospitality to urban design and overseas masterplanning projects. He was also an adjunct studio tutor at the Department of Architecture, National University of Singapore,

Alvin joined Multiply Architects LLP in 2007 when it was first incorporated and is currently the project director of the consultant team overseeing the ongoing construction of the Oasis Terraces due to be completed in 2017.
